Safeguading Update

Sharing of indecent images

Due to increased reports of young people under the age of 18 sharing images of nudes with each other, Northumbria police have asked schools to highlight that this online behaviour will stay with them forever and to think before they share indecent images.

Northumbria police have asked schools to circulate a letter which can be found here and encourage parents, carers and students to watch this video.

The police are trying to help young people understand that once they press the send button, they no longer have control over what happens or who sees their messages or images. Young people might see this as a bit of harmless fun, but if they are sharing nude images of someone who is under 18, that is a sexual offence and they could find themselves in serious trouble. The police and school encourage young people that have been affected by this issue, not to be embarrassed and to please tell a trusted adult or report it to the police.

Squid Game

Squid Game is a South Korean television series streaming on Netflix. Since its release Squid Game has become number one across 90 different countries. Young people are likely to know about the show via word of mouth and because it is so popular on social media. Currently, Squid Game has a rating of 15+ as the content includes high levels of gore, death, violence, and physical assault. It also has graphic depictions of suicide, murder, and sexual assault. The adult themes presented in the series are not appropriate for children.

The aesthetic of Squid Game, especially in promotional images and material, appears innocent and childlike. Children may not be aware of the nature of the show's content or the age rating when seeing references to the series on social media. There is also national concern that children may unintentionally put themselves in harm's way by trying to recreate elements of the series.

We ask that Parents and carers are vigilant around this and ensure children do not access age inappropriate content. Parents and carers should be aware that video content from this show can be found on TikTok and other social media platforms, which could also increase childrens interest in watching the show. Even if you restrict your child from watching Squid Game on Netflix, they may be able to access content from the series on social media platforms.
