National Ofsted Review on Peer on Peer Abuse / Safe Streets

This week we have been speaking to students in assembly about living our values day in and day out and we have also spoken to them about the national review by the Schools' Inspectorate, Ofsted relating to peer on peer abuse. The report has been well-publicised and concluded that sexual harassment has become "normalised" for young people, in school, online and in other unsupervised spaces including parks and house parties. At Heworth Grange we have already taken steps to address issues of this nature and positively promote discussions in Learning for Life lessons as well as through advisory and assemblies. The approach we have taken highlights the importance of our safeguarding procedures, our curriculum and the supportive environment that we are fostering and developing.

Within the school we have a clear Behaviour Policy which includes a need to identify and report any kind of harassment or abuse, sexual or otherwise. Our students are aware that we encourage them to log any inappropriate words or actions which we monitor and escalate our response accordingly and we consistently train our staff team to recognise and deal with derogatory behaviour. We work very hard to ensure our school community are well supported and considerate of each other. We know that the issues spoken about in the report are not just unique to schools but exist across society, and we must continue to work together to keep our children safe and free from sexual harassment.

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As a school we have robust safeguarding and pastoral systems, these are regularly audited by Consilium Trust, Local Academy Board. Please be assured we always take any concerns or allegations extremely seriously; however, we do rely on being informed. If you have any concerns of this nature please contact us to report this so that we can take action accordingly.
